TRANSFORMATIVE POTENTIAL



- Mandate fulfilled on complex climate issues
- Quality of the reports underlined by most commissioners and experts
- New and more ambitious climate measures put forward in public and political debates (e.g., Bans on advertisement of fossil fuels and polluting products, mandatory standards for product reparability and energy upgrades, greater support for disadvantaged groups)
- High level of satisfaction among participants
- Behavior changes adopted by many participants

VARIOUS LEVELS OF INFLUENCE



response to many areas of our recommendations, as it does not appear to recognise the urgency behind the Assembly's recommendations for action.

Throughout the Government's response there are many pledges using words like 'consider' and 'explore'. We would like to see a clearer roadmap, with more ambitious targets. We want the Government to commit to more specific actions, targets and timescales and to report back to us as a matter of urgency, so that we are able to hold them to account for delivery.

"100% of the Members recommended that the State should take a leadership role in addressing climate change through mitigation measures, including, for example, retrofitting public buildings (...). "

"On home retrofits, assembly members (...) had a slight preference for upgrading each home all in one go (56%), compared to upgrading each home gradually (44%) but attached conditions to the former around how it is financed."

"New Article L 173-2-1 for the Construction and Housing Code:

I. Residential buildings that do not comply with minimum energy performance standards, assessed using the energy performance diagnosis method, must be fully brought up to standard, as defined by Article 17 bis L.111-1."

EX-POST CONSIDERATION

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Distinct follow-up processes...widely different results



- Commitment to publish an argued response within a specific timeframe
- Publication of a provisional timetable for the implementation of measures
- Transparent, independent follow-up process to track the implementation of citizens' proposals
- ✓ Bridges with decision-makers (open session, hearings...) throughout the process



Permanent climate citizens' assemblies,

convening thematic, one-off assemblies – Brussels Region and City of Milan

Standing citizens advisory councils on ecological transitions in a growing number of cities

Embedded citizens' deliberation in parliamentary committees in Belgium

- Binding follow-up process
- ✓ Citizens' initiative to chose the policy topics
- More time to dwell into specific, controversial issues



German Climate Assembly - Claimed space # invited, top-down spaces :

- Champions for the assembly Former President Horst Köhler
- Strong communication strategy with proactive media outreach, collaboration with influencers and artists
- ✓ Campaign with a coalition of NGOs, academics, politicians...

Emphasis on innovation and ambition, experimentation of new governance chambers



GREATER FOCUS



✓ Too broad scope → focus on controversies

Trade-offs between mitigation / ecosystem, Equity issues, phase-out scenarios

- \checkmark Technical framing \rightarrow system change lens
- Vision of growth/progress and societal values underpinning different transition scenarios – Scotland's climate assembly
- Political economy issues power dynamics (political barriers, lobbies), investment flows
- Ecosystem approach looking beyond GHG emission reduction



SOCIAL JUSTICE



Strong concern from participants but difficulties to adequately address complex social impacts



















Need for :

- ✓ More, dedicated time
- ✓ Narrower scope
- ✓ Less **conceptual** session on social equity
- ✓ Dedicated expert support
- ✓ Data differentiated social impact analysis
- Hearings of disadvantaged groups
 vulnerable and exposed to climate change
 and climate measures

REPRESENTATIVENESS



Moving beyond BAU criteria to better reflect societal debates and people's various views, needs and constraints

✓ Attitudes toward the topic Views on climate change - CAs UK, Scotland,

Germany and Washington State

✓ Behaviors

Favorite transport modes (*cars, public transports, bikes and foot*) - Wroclaw's assembly on sustainable mobility

✓ Vulnerabilities

Brussels Citizens' Agora on Just transition

✓ Children

Discussion with children (Scotland) or children's assembly (Ireland - biodiversity loss)



- ✓ Budgeted communication strategy
- ✓ Interviews of assembly members
- ✓ Collaboration with ambassadors, partners, social media influencers

France's Citizens Convention on climate :

- Communication = 9,2% of the whole budget
- 70% of French people had heard about the CCC's proposals
- 62% of which approved these proposals
- Influence on the public debate

LOCAL DEBATES



Strong potential of citizens' assemblies to raise public awareness and foster broader conversation on societal choices

Challenging online consultation during climate assemblies

- → Cascading public discussions from the assembly to local and community dialogues
- French Citizens' Convention on Climate : public meetings with assembly members
- Scotland's climate assembly : parallel discussions at schools
- Global Assembly on Climate and Biodiversity : local community dialogues all around the world
